Parents Corner: From the Presbyterian Mission Website, a reflection and appreciation for all of our teachers/shepherds: "We Presbyterians take educational mission seriously. We value *informational* education, learning about the world and how it functions. We value *vocational* education, developing God-given talents in order to fulfill the vocation to which we have been called. And fundamentally we value *transformational* education, as the *Brief Statement of Faith* says: "The Spirit gives us courage . . . to witness to Christ as Lord and Savior, to unmask idolatries in church and culture, to hear the voices of people long silenced, and to work with others for justice, freedom, and peace." Education is one of the hallmarks of the Reformed tradition. From Calvin's Geneva, to John Knox's dictum for all of Scotland, "a school in every parish," to America and all parts of the world, education has been and continues to be a central feature of Presbyterian ministry. Presbyterian churches have always looked to the Bible as the foundation for all matters of faith and practice. Therefore it is to the Bible that these churches have turned for guidance in shaping the spirit, strategy and content of ministry in education."

Kim Long (coeditor of the new Presbyterian Book of Common Worship and formerly my professor) will be preaching. Pastors Mark and Beecher will be giving charges. Dear Sister and Brothers in Christ,

I recently heard someone say that the best questions a church should be asking are not, "What should we do?" and "How can we do it?" but "What is God already doing in our lives?" and "How can we faithfully respond?" Your session and pastoral leaders deeply believe that God is up to something wonderful and energizing and almost totally unexpected in our life together. It's as if we woke up one day and heard a fresh word that originally had been spoken to our ancestors in exile: "I am about to do a new thing," says the Lord; "now it springs forth, do you not perceive it?" (Isaiah 43:19).

On April 28th, we received a formal proposal from the session of Central Presbyterian Church that their congregation join with ours and begin a new chapter in the story of Christ's life-giving, reconciling love. In a specially called meeting on Wednesday, May 1st, the Covenant session joyfully and unanimously accepted this proposal. On June 2, 2019 our congregations will worship together as one for the first time, and then begin to live into the new life God's Spirit is weaving together.

Obviously, all this is happening very quickly and is a lot to drink in. Perhaps it would be helpful to bring us up to speed on Central's immediate history and what brought us to this new moment. As many of you already know, the Central congregation has been on a traumatic journey involving a congregational schism, lawsuit, and eventual displacement from a cherished home campus. For the last two years, Central has gathered for worship and healing at the Presbyterian Student Center at UGA. While the welcome afforded by the PSC is genuine, it cannot be long-term since they are planning major building renovations beginning in the fall. During their time there, Central has discerned that its most hopeful way forward is not to build or buy a new building but to incorporate their strong faith and many gifts into the life of an existing partner congregation. Over time, the vision that emerged for them was joining with you, a community with whom they share not only some common history and friendships but a strong commitment for compassionate service in Athens.

So, what might this joining of our two congregations look like? And what are some of the concrete implications? In all honesty, I cannot provide a completely satisfying answer to those questions. But here's what we know so far:

• We will not remain two autonomous congregations worshiping under one roof. Instead, and as I've heard some leaders from both congregations say, we will be entering into a kind of marriage covenant, becoming a blended family that intends to worship together, study together, and serve our neighbors together. In other words, we intend to bring together two existing congregations, and not simply welcome individuals into membership from a church that has ceased to exist. At present, Central's congregation is made up of between 25 and 40 members.

• For the time being, Central's five session members will join with ours to offer guidance and leadership; eventually we plan to include former Central members in the nominating process for one twelve member session.

• Central's current pastor, the Rev. Rindy Trouteaud, will accompany Central in this period of transition and be paid through existing Central financial resources through the end of 2019.

• Central's current handbell director, David Boardman, will explore the creation of a handbell choir and will also be paid by Central funds through the end of 2019. Our hope is that over time possible roles in our life together for both Rindy and David will emerge.

•Central will continue its current local mission commitments like Our Daily Bread and IHNA, thus providing additional opportunities for Covenant members to serve in Christ's name.

•For the time being, and for legal reasons, Central will maintain its tax ID, PIN for the PCUSA, and a separate investment account with the Presbyterian Foundation for the funds they received from the lawsuit settlement. Their desire is that this money might be used to create a lasting missional legacy in the Athens community.

•All other financial issues will be resolved through meetings of the finance teams of both congregations, with all members eventually pledging to one common purse.

•An existing agreement with two UGA music students to participate in the choir and be supported financially by the Dolvin Foundation will be renegotiated for the fall semester of 2019.

Perhaps I am stating the obvious when I say that none of us can know exactly how all of this is going to play out over time. However, I hope that you can feel the joy that comes when receiving an unexpected gift. Because it is my belief that this is what the presence of Central in our life together is: an incredible gift from God. It also feels like a wonderful opportunity to model the possibility of new life in a presbytery filled with congregations that would very likely be stronger together than they are apart. And, after enduring a long and very public fight over inclusivity within the church, the coming together of our two congregations can be a much-needed witness that God's resurrecting love always gets the last word.

I'm aware that this letter will not answer all your questions, but feel free to ask the ones that remain; I, along with our session members, will do our very best to respond as clearly as we can. But also take the time to warmly greet our brothers and sisters from Central who are joining us on this discipleship journey, beginning June 2nd. And let us all come together and celebrate this "new thing" that God is doing in our midst at a post-worship reception on Pentecost Sunday, June 9th. I don't know about you, but I feel a mighty wind blowing Grace and peace. Mark Harper
