PENTECOST OFFERING

In response to the denomination's Matthew 25 invitation and with support from the Pentecost Offering, we will begin taking action to dismantle structural racism in our community by using the local portion of this denominational offering to help underwrite the costs of our 8-week summer camp where children from our surrounding neighborhoods as well as children active in the life of Covenant will be challenged to work together to learn more about how we can care for creation and build a more environmentally sus-

tainable future. Travis Williams, Covenant's Neighborhood Ministries Coordinator, in collaboration with the leadership of UGA's Grow It Know It program, promises a unique and transformative outdoor camp experience filled with creative activities for young people.

The Pentecost Offering is one of five denominational offerings designed to nurture the faith of those who are the "church to come" - children, youth, and young adults. Psalm 71 testifies that a foundation of faith established during childhood helps ensure lifelong faith and service. The patterns and lessons established during these formative years continue to bear fruit throughout a person's life. Forty percent of the funds received in this offering remain with Covenant for the purpose of addressing the spiritual formation needs of young people. The remainder, 60%, will be sent to the Presbyterian Mission Agency to address the global needs of children, youth, and young adults. As promised, here is my description of the proposed 2021-2022 budget for the church. You received a proposed budget in the packet you got by mail, but it has since been updated to include an additional recommendation from Personnel, so a revised version will be emailed, available online, or through regular mail by request for you to look at as you consider your pledge to support Covenant financially. If you have already sent in a pledge based on the old budget and wish to reconsider your pledge in light of the updated information, please let Karen know.

You will notice that the jump from last year's budget to this year's budget is quite large. Some of that is artificial, since we revised the 2020-2021 budget to reflect the reality of the pandemic shuttering several of our programs. Our pledges for last year were also lower than expected due to our uncertainty with what we would be able to give. Last year's revised budget was cut down to remove several items like support for Montreat, the summer mission trip, two music interns, the Pastor's contingency fund, and the Long-term Maintenance contribution. I have put all of those back into next year's budget to fully account for all our normal (non-pandemic) expenditures. That alone raised the proposed budget by \$35,000. Since our pledged income in the current fiscal year (2020-21) has been higher than expected, we may be able to do some similar adjustments to the next year's budget to based on giving beyond the pledged amounts this year. We have also used some of the additional income this year to work on refurbishing the Worship Center and other parts of the property while it is not being used based on guidance from Session.

The other large changes to the budget are a proposed expenditure of \$25,000 for HVAC maintenance and improvement of ventilation, the hire of a music coordinator to replace Jacob, and Personnel-recommended salary raises of 1.5% for all staff members, including our contracted custodial care, which has not been increased in several years. Travis Williams' salary was adjusted to reflect his full year of work instead of the partial year he worked in 2020-21. The latest recommendation from Personnel, added to the budget after your mailed copy was sent out, includes a change to hire a full-time Technical Director at \$45,000 (plus FICA and \$11,000 for health care) to replace Asher Hill's part-time pay of \$24,000 per year. Other changes recommended by the ministry teams were relatively small and reflect a return to more normal operating conditions as we return to in-person worship next fiscal year.

Time Phases for "Going Solar" at Cov Presby

Implementing the solar panel system proposed for Cov Presby would encompass four essential timeframes. Yet to be determined is the initial period, that needed to secure financial pledges sufficient to execute the plan.



Next is the 2 to 3 months needed to: (a) get on the installer's job calendar,

(b) secure local construction permits, (c) reach accord with Georgia Power as the back-up electricity supplier, and (d) assure procurement and delivery of the system contractor's various component installation materials.

About 1 month would be expected for on-site installation work. Modest disruption in electricity usage would be incurred.

Finally, 1 to 2 months may be required for testing-out and fine-tuning the operational status of the solar panel system.

EARTH DAY, WEEK, MONTH, YEAR CONTINUES... MORE ITEMS TO RECYCLE

7. Compostable bio-plastics: Compostable bioplastics include those cornstarch utensils and specially marked cups, which won't break down quickly in your home compost bin like your food scraps do. Find a Composter has a tool for finding municipal composters for these types of items.



8. Computers and electronics: <u>E-Stewards</u> has a tool for finding responsible recyclers for computing waste which can be toxic and hard to break down.

9. Exercise videos: If you've done the same workouts a million times, swap them with others at Video Fitness. If you're done with them forever, contact your closest e-waste station and see if they will accept them. Policies change frequently and the magnetic tape in VHS makes them particularly difficult to recycle.

10. Eyeglasses: Your local Lion's Club or eye care chain may collect these. Lenses are reground and given to people in need. Often eye doctors' offices will collect them, or even local libraries. Glasses are most often donated as-is to someone with a similar prescription. Reading glasses and non-prescription sunglasses can often be donated as well.
