
When Kathy Boardman got the ball rolling on cleaning out the church library, I wanted to help. Looking at the books crowded on the shelves, it was easy to see that it had been carefully organized and cared for in the past. Time, however, had marched on. Many of the books were now outdated or in poor shape. And when the Climate Change Committee needed room to share books, there was no room. Members of different Sunday School classes wanted to swap class books, but the shelves were packed too tight. As someone with a library degree, I knew the collection needed weeding, repairing, and reorganizing. I soon realized these humble tasks are a ministry.

In my own faith journey, some harsh experiences in my teenaged years made me deeply question my beliefs, and it was the works of authors Madeleine L'Engle and C. S. Lewis that kept me tethered long enough to reconnect. In times of spiritual hunger or doubt, many of us haunt libraries or bookstores, hoping to find something to grasp. The beauty of a donation-based church library is that instead of simply finding the latest bestsellers, we hopefully find titles our fellow members found useful before us. In that spirit, although we do want the revamped library to grow, we don't wish to fill up the shelves willy nilly. # TerraCycle + Kroger Packaging = \$\$

A few weeks ago, I mailed our first box of Kroger packaging to TerraCycle and it earned \$13.65. This is important because TerraCycle does not pay the shipping costs for packaging such as candy bags and wrappers, so the \$13.65 will go toward that.

If you shop at Kroger, saving plastic bags and wrappers for TerraCycle is easy because there are so many items that qualify. A few examples: bread bags, frozen vegetable and fruit bags, chip and salty snack bags, bags from cookies, nuts, coffee and fresh produce such as carrots, apples, potatoes, etc. Also, wrappers from packages of paper products and bottled water.

Remember, only Kroger brands count. This includes Simple Truth, Private Selection, Luvsome pet products, as well as the ordinary Kroger brand. *Caren Snook for the Green Dream Team*

The Athens Emergency Food Bank are still in need of egg cartons and brown paper grocery bags and <u>heavy duty</u> plastic bags.



# "Fix-It Persons" Being Sought

The B&G MT is faced with a variety of tasks that merit being addressed, but not all can be accomplished by B&G members themselves. Other folks are invited to contribute their talents and time. For example . . .



Missing edge-molding needs repair on a preschool hallway bulletin board

Weather stripping on enter-exit doorways merits assessment and if needed replacement

The container of collected engine oil should be removed from the trash disposal area to disposal by a local engine oil retail business

Peeling paint on the exterior narthex surfaces needs removal, and then restoring with a proper outdoor finish that will not peel off

Handrails on the steps to the outdoor worship area should be refinished with safety-blue paint

*Lines and symbols for handicapped parking spaces in the entry driveway should be finished with safety-blue paint* 

Similar work may be needed for handicapped parking spaces in the exit driveway

Wooden benches on the front patio (4) and in the Memorial Garden (2) need to be oiled for protection from winter precipitation and temperatures

Insulation along with a ceiling tile needs restoration in the Fellowship Hall ceiling

Metal posts as well as bases in the Fellowship Hall warrant paint refreshening

Blinking lightbulbs in the Fellowship Hall portico ceiling need replacement

Stucco patching compound and suitable paint should be applied in various locations on the enter driveway, as well as around the building

Pressure washing of stains from sidewalks and entry doors to the Worship Center is needed

These, along with other tasks, will be posted for reference on the B&G MT bulletin board, near the Memorial Garden stairway entrance. Feel free to pose questions for guidance, as well as to sign-up to address, and to sign-off when completing a task.

# Speaking in celebration, the B&G MT commends the following work.

Of course, the refurbished sanctuary's color selection team of volunteers, Hilda Clark, Arnelle Combs, Susan Parish (Ch), Georgiana Sumner, and Valerie Stone, began seeing its coordinative work come together during the past few weeks on walls, doors, window and door frames, and carpet colors.

Restoration of the Cov Presby Worship Center was enabled, not only by the work of that team and respective outside contractors, but by the inside refreshening and cleaning efforts of volunteers such as Kay and Paul Brooks, Alex Clark, Asher Hill, Karen Foutz, Linda Koehler, Phil Koehler, Betsy Burmeister, Rich Reaves, and Hank Tweedell. Carpeted and hard floors as well as light soffits and window frames were vacuumed of sheetrock and carpet dust; pendant lightbulbs were changed; windows and doors were washed; pew bibles and hymnals were dusted off and returned to place; surface gouges, scars and dings were treated or removed from pews; live-streaming electronic components were installed; functional order was restored to the narthex and chancel; and areas of the campus that temporarily housed pews and worship supplies were tidied and returned to former usages.

During this same time, a robust volunteer team of cleanout artists, Arnelle Combs, Carolyn Hatfield, and Ellen Stoneburner, renewed the appearance and functionality of the Fellowship Hall chair closet, as well as sanitized and removed marks from the white vinyl tables used for fellowship events as well as the Thursday food pantry. More improvements are promised by this crew.

Virtually all of the persons listed above, with the addition of Jennifer Frye, Larry Hatfield, Steve Rathbun, Linda Rogers, Chris Wilson, and Dick Zimdars, had been previously involved lending hands to convert the Fellowship Hall into a temporary worship space. It has now been returned to fulfilling previous tasks. Thanks to one and all!



# THORNWELL HOME FOR CHILDREN Serving JESUS, by serving others!


