Come Warship With Us <u>COVENANT IS NOW HAVING IN PERSON WORSHIP - November 21, 2021 at 10:00am in the Worship Center!</u>

The Worship Ministry Team continues to carefully watch the local Covid status and, most particularly, safe practices at Covenant. At our 11.18.21 meeting, we decided to ease two or three of our current

practices. Effective this Sunday, we will increase the attendance number to 100, and remove the pew ropes. Each week the attendance number has been rising just a little. Last week we had 66 in-person worshipers. We believe that a good pattern of social distancing is in place, and will continue. Removing pew ropes will make it a little easier for a few more people to be seated in a "distanced" pattern. At least for the present time, we will discontinue the online signup for worship.

Additionally, those who lead our music during worship, both vocals and instrumentals, will have the option of removing their masks while singing or playing. The congregation will still be required to wear masks. We will continue to monitor our practices and keep you informed with updates. In any group of people, there will be a range of comfort levels. We respect them all, and hope that you will find a way to safely worship with Covenant. These changes do not reflect a return to the old normal...they reflect a progression of practices in the new normal.

If the new normal, over time, includes another surge in cases, we will modify our practices. We think that is the new normal. If you are looking for the safest seat in the worship center, perhaps the back pews are your most comfortable choices. We are trying to manage risk for the big picture. We encourage you to continue to manage your risk on a very personal level. As in the past, Covid vaccinations are the most important guideline we can hold onto.

Library Corner: Madeleine L'Engle (1918-2007)

In my first Library Corner piece, I mentioned author Madeleine L'Engle. She was most famous for her Newbery Medal young adult science fiction book, *A Wrinkle in Time*. As wonderful and affirming as that book is, however, is just the tip of the iceberg. L'Engle wrote over 60 published novels, poet-



ry compilations, and non-fiction books. In our church library, we are lucky to have three of her "Crosswicks Quartet" books. *A Circle of Quiet* is the first of these published autobiographical journals and it explores how she felt faith interwove with daily life. The second book in the series is *The Summer of the Great Grandmother* and focuses on the summer when L'Engle brought her elderly mother to live with her. Although it explores aging, dementia, and even suffering in an honest way, it never loses sight of hope. *The Irrational Season*, third in the series, ventures chronologically through the liturgical year, finding personal meaning in Advent, Christmas, Epiphany, Lent, Good Friday, Easter, and beyond. Although it isn't part of L'Engle's journal series, we also have a copy of her non-fiction book *Walking on Water: Reflections on Faith and Art*. If you're looking to check one of these out from the church library, you'll find them in Bay F, Shelf 4 and Bay C, Shelf 3.



TerraCycle + Kroger Packaging = \$\$


A few weeks ago, I mailed our first box of Kroger packaging to TerraCycle and it earned \$13.65. This is important because TerraCycle does not pay the shipping costs for packaging such as candy bags and wrappers, so the \$13.65 will go toward that.

If you shop at Kroger, saving plastic bags and wrappers for TerraCycle is easy because there are so many items that qualify. A few examples: bread bags, frozen vegetable and fruit bags, chip and salty snack bags, bags from cookies, nuts, coffee and fresh produce such as carrots, apples, potatoes, etc. Also, wrappers from packages of paper products and bottled water.

Remember, only Kroger brands count. This includes Simple Truth, Private Selection, Luvsome pet products, as well as the ordinary Kroger brand. *Caren Snook for the Green Dream Team*

The Athens Emergency Food Bank are still in need of egg cartons and brown paper grocery bags and heavy duty plastic bags.



The B&G MT is faced with a variety of tasks that merit being addressed, but not all can be accomplished by B&G members themselves. Other folks are invited to contribute their talents and time. For example . . .



Nandina seedlings should be uprooted from the liriope and iris beds along the exit driveway

Nandina and boxwood hedges around the campus buildings should be cut to heights of 24"-30"

The Memorial Garden slope should be cleared of all volunteer seedlings except for gardenias, azaleas, and crepe myrtles; and the Memorial Garden's circular sitting area should feature the present roses and annual flowers

The front patio floral pots should be maintained with seasonal plantings

The enter driveway flower bed as well as frontyard main sign floral areas should be maintained with seasonal plantings

Debris surrounding the Brian Koehler shed should be removed to the landfill

Periodically left-off shopping carts should be returned to pertinent retailers
