COVID UPDATE On Friday, March 4, the Session approved an update to Covenant's COVID policies (see below) using the new CDC mask guidance released late February 2022. This guidance uses a red, yellow, and green system reflecting current case rates and hospitalizations related to COVID in a county. Since these ratings are being updated weekly, it offers an easy-to-use and timely way for Covenant to respond to the changing COVID landscape based on the color rating system. Given Covenant's priorities to continue moving toward a full opening while preserving the health and well-being of its members, the following COVID policies began **MONDAY, MARCH 7** for Covenant using the CDC rating system:

COVENANT'S COVID POLICIES (EFFECTIVE MARCH 7, 2022)

Please do not plan to attend in person gatherings if you are feeling ill in any way or have been diagnosed with a current case of COVID-19 or recently exposed to someone who has. We strongly encourage all those who are eligible to be fully vaccinated before entering the facility.

Guidelines for Gathering inside Covenant Presbyterian Church - based on the CDC's Community Level Rating

- **Green Rating** Mask wearing is optional with indoor and outdoor food and drink options. Please be considerate of personal preferences to remain contact-free and social distance.
- Yellow Rating Mask wearing is highly recommended with outdoor food and drink options. Please be considerate of personal preferences to remain contact-free and social distance.
- **Red Rating** Mask wearing is required. Social distancing, in-person worship attendance caps, restricted food and drink activities, and virtual services only may be recommended.

Athens-Clarke County's current CDC rating is yellow. Any changes to ACC's rating will be announced in the Covenanter, online, and in worship. You can check ACC's current CDC rating here: https://www.cdc.gov/coronavirus/2019-ncov/science/community-levels-county-map.html.



Who Wants to Take Over TerraCycle?

As my 80th birthday is rapidly approaching, I would like to give up my TerraCycle responsibilities. What does TerraCycle require? The primary need is space to keep cardboard cartons for saving up recyclables. When the boxes are full, they must be shipped at the UPS store. Shipping labels must be printed out for some boxes. Twice a year, it is necessary to request a check, via the TerraCycle website, for the money that TerraCycle has paid for the recyclables that we have shipped during the previous 6 months. Therefore, a little bit of record-keeping is necessary. Also, the batteries and printer cartridges have to be taken to CHaRM 3 or 4 times a year. Lastly, an article should be written for the Covenanter occasionally. These articles serve 2 purposes: to keep the congregation informed about changes in the items that TerraCycle accepts, and to encourage the congregation to participate in TerraCycle recycling. This is really not a lot of work and the reward—keeping a lot of plastic out of the landfill—is great. CARPET RE-INSTALLATION

Beginning Monday, March 14, 2022, re-installation of new carpet will occur in the Cov Presby Worship Center. Work completion is targeted for Friday, March 18.

People using the church during this week are reminded that hallways and some rooms in campus buildings will host stored pews, chairs, and other items. Please alert friends and colleagues about this inconven-

ience.

Worshippers on Sunday, March 13, are invited to help remove pew bibles, hymnals, song books, and other items for temporary storage in the narthex. This task will be led by the Worship Ministry Team. Due to a mistake in production, known is "side match error", the new replacement carpet is being provided at the manufacturer's expense, per the original contractual agreement with Athens' Carpets Unlimited.

Carpet being taken-up will not be available for use elsewhere in the building, primarily due to damage arising upon its removal, caused by adhesive that binds the carpet to the concrete slab in the Worship Center.

Immediately upon completing the installation, electric fans will be activated to hasten removal of odors from this process, to prepare for worship on March 20.

Last week we delved into Celtic Spirituality. If you are intrigued, a great place to start exploring is with John O'Donohue (1956-2008). Although the world lost O'Donohue much too soon, this poet and scholar left behind a rich legacy of spiritual writings. *A Celtic Pilgrimage* is an hour-long film (DVD) that pieces together interviews with O'Donohue and showcases his Irish roots. O'Donohue explains the links he finds between nature and spirituality, and then the film lets you see the wild landscapes that inspired him (Bay C, Shelf 4). – Church Librarian *Valerie Stone* (If you have books by John O'Donohue that you would like to give to our library, you can leave them on the donations shelf.)


