- Green Rating Mask wearing is optional with indoor and outdoor food and drink options. Please be considerate of personal preferences to remain contact-free and social distance.
- Yellow Rating— Mask wearing is highly recommended with outdoor food and drink options. Please be considerate of personal preferences to remain contact-free and social distance.
- **Red Rating** Mask wearing is required. Social distancing, in-person worship attendance caps, restricted food and drink activities, and virtual services only may be recommended.



Please submit prayer concerns and/or celebrations to the church office 706-548-2756 or kwetherington@covpresathens.org. or before worship service fill out the Prayer Concern form and put in offering plate or give to Pastor Dana. **CAMP UPDATE!** As most have noticed, we've had a homeless encampment on our grounds for the last six months or so. The camp began out of inattention during COVID, as the church grounds were rarely occupied, and out of a sense of altruism, recognizing that many were facing hardships during the pandemic. The original campers were tidy and quiet, but as the camp grew, drama and friction accompanied the increased population. Eventually, police were regularly arriving on our property to resolve issues. Responding to complaints from our neighbors in Green Acres and the management of the shopping center, Clarke County Code Enforcement issued us a citation requiring us to remove the camp and clean up refuse.

Our first choice had been to relocate campers to the county's new homeless camp, but the new camp would not be open in time to accommodate the enforcement deadline. A possible moratorium on enforcement was rejected when one of the campers set another's tent on fire.

Most of the campers we helped move to a clandestine camp about a quarter mile from the church. We felt we had to call the police for one camper who wouldn't cooperate in the move (likely more out of being overwhelmed than obstinance). He unfortunately had an outstanding warrant and was arrested. We were able to gather a fair number of his valuables and move them to a storage unit belonging to a friend. We stay in touch and want to help him get on his feet when he leaves jail.

A final camper was a larger challenge. We had loaded up her gear and were prepared to move her when she refused to leave. The police were called and we agreed to give her 24 hours to find a place to go and we would move her gear. On the following morning she was interfering in the cleanup and the police were called to remove her from the property. Ultimately we were able to provide very little help for her, although she has since relocated on her own with the other campers

We maintain contact with most of the campers and are helping move them to the county camp if they choose and as space is available. Our Homeless Taskforce committee of Chris Wilson, Bert Ballard-Myer, and I have realized that we cannot solve the problem of homelessness, even on a small scale. But at the same time, we realize that we can provide comfort to a few, and we have forged alliances in the homeless services community. The camps are removed from our property and we are in code compliance, but this is not a closed issue at Covenant. And as a policy voted on by the Session, we continue to provide a place for an overnight stop for those needing it. Please know that we are working to improve communication with the congregation on this issue.

I have been attending this church for almost my entire life. Many of you have known me since I was young and have been very supportive of me in my youth and in my adult life. Up until this point my responsibilities have been fairly straightforward, consisting of technical projects such as installation and maintenance of systems, overseeing the tech needs of various meetings and events, and operating the streaming equipment and live sound for Sunday Services.


