Fiscal summary statement for 2021-2022 fiscal year

The 2021-2022 fiscal year ended on June 30, 2022. Here is a summary of income and expenses for the year.

Income was received from the following sources: Pledges \$439,198.88 (anticipated \$426,760.00), non-pledged income \$2,318.32 (budgeted \$19,787), other income including rent \$1,488.00 (budgeted \$3,000) for a total of \$443,005.20 compared to a budgeted amount from all sources of



\$449,547. Some amounts that were originally counted as non-pledged income turned into pledged income due to late pledges received last fall after the budget was finalized.

Expenses for the 2021-2022 fiscal year totaled \$384,007.71. The amount budgeted was \$428,455.14, leading to a net balance of \$44,447.43 in budgeted funds not spent. A detailed list of expenditures was provided to Session for the ministry team heads in the July Session packet. Karen can provide copies if needed.

Based on the income minus expenses, the net amount of money received minus expenses was \$58,997.49 (\$443,005.20-\$384,997.71). In 2022-2023, \$23,600 of this unspent money will be used to pay for items removed from the proposed 2022-2023 budget, including capital reserve (\$7,500), three months of transition funding for the Technical Director position (\$8,775) plus health care (\$1,875), an intern for Christian Education (\$2,250), an external financial audit (\$1,200) and \$2,000 for the pastor's benevolence fund. The remainder of unspent funds will be placed in the general fund of the church to be used for future needs as designated by the Session.

Thanks to all of our Covenant family for faithfully fulfilling their pledges as well as supporting the church in so many other ways!

Kirby Kesler had a tent here with his significant other when we had the encampment here. Unlike most of the other campers, when he left the only remnant was a dry spot in the leaves. We stayed in touch as he's preternaturally friendly and he gives us advice on flooring and carpet, which is his lifelong trade.

When the Journey room finally was ready for a floor, I took Kirby by his old employer to pick up his tools and he did an expert job of laying the tile in that room (take a look). After he finished, he told me, "I want to thank you for the work, not for the money, but because someone trusted me, and that means a lot".

A couple days ago, Kirby told me he was out 'signing', when his brother (also his ex-employer) stopped by in his truck, got out, and told him he'd been looking for him for two days. He's been estranged from his brother for over a year, but his brother hugged him and told him to come back to work Thursday. Kirby had been itching to get off the streets and eagerly accepted.

I'm really honored to have a possibility to address you today. Many greetings from Olomouc, the partner congregation of the ECCB, from all our members as well as from my wife Dagmar. It's been a long time since we met one another. The main reason was Covid.

But on the other hand, we started to prepare the partnership conference 2023 in Olomouc and we are looking forward to meeting after a long break. I suppose there will be many topics to be discussed next year!

All of You, who already visited our congregation and are planning to come again, will see many changes. Two new bridges in the nearest neighbourhood, the new regulation of the river Morava as well as some improvements inside. I think You will be surprised......

But the main change, much more worse than Covid, is a war in Ukraine and its struggle to survive under Russian aggression. Our congregation accommodated/gave shelter to one whole family in Febraury in upper rooms of our church (manse). The family moved already to their own flat, and we could welcome recently a second one. Besides that, in a small flat downstairs stays another Ukrainian woman from Kyiv – Svitlana, with her dog. Different people, but equally difficult stories, full of pain. All those people are great and I must say – we became friends. Two of the children joined us in our summer camp...

Besides that we provided a possibility for the meetings of Ukrainian community in Olomouc. About 30 – 40 people used to came every Wednesday since March to have their program in their mother tongue. Now they have a summer break, but the meetings can continue in September.

On Wednesdays at 6.p.m. we have a regular prayers for Ukraine. You can join us, if you want. We pray for Ukraine to win the war and save its freedom. We pray for Putin to be stopped.

The evil must always be resisted, sometimes even by weapons; the policy of appearement is false. These are our frequent topics of discussion....

Dear friends in Christ, we think about You and pray for you all. We hope to see you soon.

Stories of Ukrainians from the Czech Republic

My friend called me on 24th February at 6:20 am. I heard from the phone: "Have you heard the explosions? The war has begun!" It was unexpected, strange, unbelievable. Together with our friend and her family we left our homes the very first day, in a rush, not knowing what we're doing. We got into a car and drove for 31 hours without sleep. Before us there was only void and uncertainty. We stayed for a couple days in Moldavia with my friend's relatives. We read the reports from Ukraine about military operations in Gostomel, Irpin and Bucha those are towns near Kyiv. Also about air bombings, that were undertaken in different parts of the country. It was clear that there is no way back in the near future. Already on the way to Moldavia I had a thought that later became a decision - go to Czechia. I visited this beautiful country twice as a tourist. I liked it very much - nature, architecture, people and language. Something here reminds me of Ukraine. I didn't know a single person here, despite that fact I went through four countries and now I'm here...It was morally very tough, because what's happening in my country is also happening in my heart no matter where I am at. But even in the most difficult situations you have to keep moving forward and do something for it. So over time I managed to find a job, make new friends and get to a very cozy home in a very friendly atmosphere in the evangelical church. I am grateful to people who gave me the feeling of safety, feeling every citizen of Ukraine is in a dire need of right now. We've all lost the most precious things in our lives. Our home and the hope in the future. Ruthless aggression, occurring as we speak in our country, is just beyond comprehension. Why did one country decide to completely enslave another independent country? There is no answer for that. I really wish for peace, prosperity and happiness for Ukraine! It's a rich country with a long history, beautiful nature and modern society.

Spring two years ago we walked in surgical masks, watched tens of thousands of cases of new COVID infections and were worried about our elderly relatives and friends... A year ago we tried to keep track of the vaccination rules and waited for our turn... This spring I checked news on websites and on Facebook every few hours in a hope that a rocket didn't hit my birth town or that one of my close ones did not die in the war...The stories of the refugees I met at the KACPU (regional center for helping the Ukranians), or at the meetings at Blahoslavova 1 (evangelical church) or every Friday at the psychological assistance group at Pavelčákova 1, that's not propaganda. It's pain, tears, the loss of own house' comfort, it's weeks of hiding in the basement, a 700 km long journey through villages, 50 checkpoints in these villages...It's shattered windows, cooking on a fire in a yard of a tall building, rocket launches and souls departing... It's stories of Russian soldiers looting and it's stories of an incredible support of Ukranians, Czechs, Poles, Russians in Europe, support from the entire world, in which humanity still prevails over nationality. When I see disoriented refugees, running from Kyiv, Charkov, Chernigov, all being bombarded, lost their homes and closed ones in Mariupol, rum from Hostomel and Bucha, I am grateful to the Czech Republic, that these refugees have a place to go and save their lives and lives of their children. In the past few months, I met tens of honest hearts, who help regardless of the resources, times and energy loss. Thank y'all for help, thanks Czech people for supporting Ukrainian refugees and Ukrainian soldiers. I strongly hope that newly built independent Ukraine will be a democratic country, where everyone is respected for his/her actions and those who helped in difficult times are remembered. Thanks, Olomouc, thanks, Czechia.
